for Chlamydia (CT) and Gonorrhea (NG)

This document reflects commonly reported ICD-10-CM diagnosis codes for chlamydia and gonorrhea. This is not an all-inclusive list. See the ICD-10-CM official guidelines for coding and reporting for further guidance regarding the use of ICD-10-CM diagnosis codes. **Reporting of specific ICD-10-CM diagnosis codes for chlamydia and gonorrhea varies by Payer and should be confirmed prior to submission of claims.**

Chlamydia and Gonorrhea Screening vs. Diagnostic Tests

	Screening Tests	Diagnostic Tests
Purpose	To help prevent illness, disease or other health problems.	To establish presence and/or absence of disease for diagnosis.
Target Population	Examples could be: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Asymptomatic females • At risk females 	Examples could be: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Symptomatic females and males • Retesting of a positive screening test
Costs**	Chlamydia and/or gonorrhea screening covered without cost-sharing for women (younger women and high-risk women).	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Varies by payer • Chlamydia and/or gonorrhea testing for symptomatic patients may include cost-sharing.

* Preventive care services are covered for those enrolled under the Affordable Care Act (ACA) and as required by the ACA.

† The ACA designated resources that identify the preventive services required for coverage are:

- United States Preventive Services Task Force (USPSTF) grade A or B recommendations
- Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP) recommendations adopted by the Director of the Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC)
- Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) supported comprehensive guidelines

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
